EDUCATION CORNER

A BRIEF HISTORY OF FREEMASONRY

As the years passed one Grand Lodge was organized in each state, sovereign within its own limits, no other Grand Lodge having any right to control Masonic affairs under its jurisdiction. Today in the United States there are fifty two Grand Lodges, one for each state, one for the District of Columbia and one in Puerto Rico. On their rolls are more than 165,500 Lodges with almost 3,500,000 members.

Masonry moved westward with the pioneers and one Grand Lodge after another was formed in the several states.

The Grand Lodge of California was organized at Sacramento in 1850 and began chartering Lodges in that state, and contiguous Masonically unoccupied territory.
